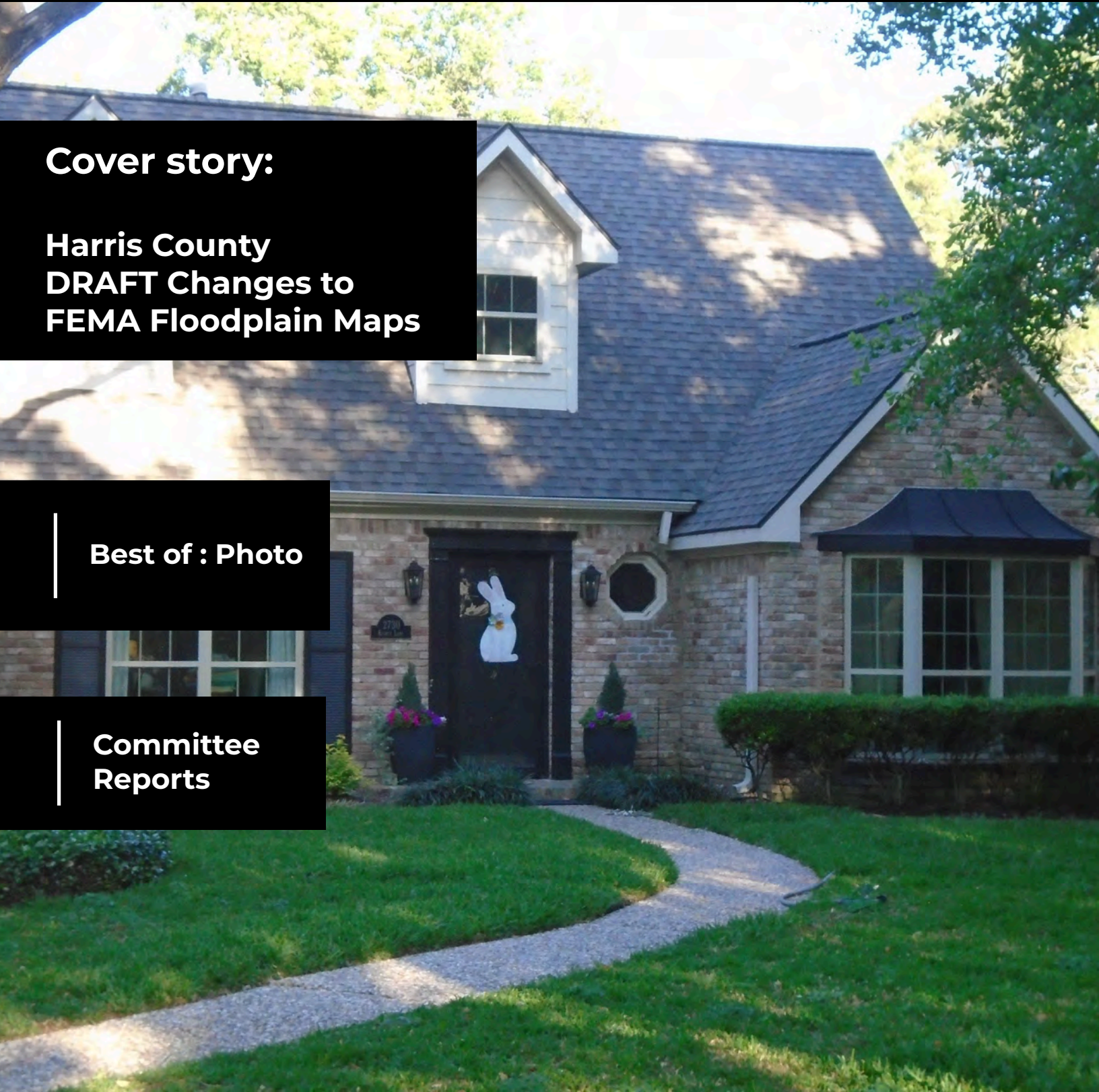

New FEMA DRAFT , Floodplain RISK Maps for Harris County

I can't say that I've been eagerly awaiting the new Draft Floodplain Insurance Rate Maps (Draft FIRMs) for Harris County. But at least my anxiously dreading status is over since the DRAFT maps are now available for review. Many of us are in for a surprise.

The **Federal Emergency Management Agency** (FEMA) is responsible for creating these maps. All stages for this map completion can be viewed in the 4 Phase explanation on their website page for the **RISK mapping process**. It is important to stress that the maps are officially in the DRAFT stage, also known as Phase 2. According to **ReduceFlooding.Com's** reportage Harris County officials are not expecting a new finalized, legal map from FEMA for at least a year or two.

The upcoming, multiple PRELIMINARY MAPS (Phase 3) will incorporate engineering studies, comment periods by floodplain managers, and other further internal activities. Once these are completed, homeowners will have the opportunity to comment and/or protest their revised floodplain status.

The new DRAFT flood maps are based on rain data obtained after Hurricane Harvey (2017) while the old maps utilized data obtained after Tropical Storm Allison (2001). Homeowners can compare their old floodplain classification with new FEMA DRAFT classifications by visiting this **interactive map** and making sure to check the "Mapping Change Comparison" box option on the website page. You can then move the black, vertical slider bar to view the before and after floodplain categorization changes (if any) for your property.

According to the Houston Chronicle's interactive Zip Code Ranking Map, one of several maps included within a recent **article**, when using the new draft maps about 42% of properties in the 77080 boundary and 58% of properties in the 77043 boundary would move to a higher risk zone category.

One bright ray of sunshine glimpsed through these dark clouds is that for those of us who use the federal National Flood Insurance Program for our flood insurance, the formula to determine insurance costs is not contingent upon these new flood map drafts:

"Historically, well over 90% of flood insurance policyholders in the U.S. have obtained their coverage through the federal government's National Flood Insurance Program. For decades, the NFIP used locations within flood zones on federal maps as a major factor in determining insurance premium prices.

That changed in the early 2020s under a new system called **Risk Rating 2.0**, which uses 30-plus data points to better measure each property's vulnerability to flooding. Location in a flood map is not a factor, so premium calculations shouldn't change under the updated maps."

Many of us may want to understand the steps for protesting/appealing flood zone classification to effectively and efficiently challenge this status during the official appeal time frame. The protest window is 90 days from the date FEMA provides legal notice for appeals to be submitted. This process occurs after the publication of its PRELIMINARY FLOOD INSURANCE MAPS.

Simply stating/documenting that your home has never flooded is not considered objective evidence when protesting.

“... an appeal should be accompanied by data and documentation indicating that the proposed new or modified flood hazard information shown on the preliminary products is scientifically or technically incorrect. The information submitted by the appellant should indicate a modification or update to the information used to prepare the preliminary FIRM (Floodplain Insurance Rate Maps) and/or FIS (Flood Insurance Study) report. Appellants are asked to demonstrate better methodologies, assumptions or data exists and provide alternative analyses or data used to develop the new or updated flood hazard information on the preliminary FIRM with their appeal package”.

Direct Quote from “[Appeals and Comments: Information for Property Owners](#)”, FEMA, pg. 2, April – 20.

Preparing in advance will make complying with the 90-day protest time frame much easier. Here are some proactive information tips/links:

- 1) Review the FEMA's [Community Members' Guide](#) to Initiating Map Revisions.
- 2) Review the [Letter of Map Change Request](#) to change your flood plain risk status for your property
- 3) Verify your property elevation if you think the current, officially reported elevation data is wrong. This requires verification by a [Texas licensed surveyor or an engineer](#).
- 4) Follow [press updates](#) from Harris County Flood Control District.

Hopefully with this information in hand during the calm before the storms we can effectively address future property, floodplain risk status.

Beautification Committee Report

There are no new changes to report for April/ May. We are still in the process of replacing the three PVB irrigation valves that were stolen along Hammerly and installing protective steel cages to prevent future theft. The cost provided by LMC is \$2,500 (not included in the original November 2025 approved budget as the theft occurred after the budget approval process) which includes replacement of the PVB valves, City of Houston inspection, and installation of the steel cages.

BEAUTIFICATION BUDGET BREAKDOWN: 2026

The Committee budgeted \$10,500 for Plant and Sign Maintenance, allocated as follows:

- \$2,500 – New SSCA metal signs throughout the subdivision
- \$2,500 – Esplanades/Medians at Kempwood (redo end caps)
- \$5,500 – Tree maintenance along Kempwood and Hammerly

COMMUNITY AND GOVERNMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

Spring Branch Super Neighborhood Council

Spring Shadows Civic Association was once a part of the Spring Branch North (Spring Shadows) Super Neighborhood Council, Inc., but is now dormant, as are the Super Neighborhoods West, and East.

Through the efforts of Catherine Barchfeld-Alexander (Central), a newly formed Spring Branch Super Neighborhood Council, comprised of Central, North (Spring Shadows), East, and West Super Neighborhood is intended as an umbrella Super Neighborhood to more effectively advocate before the City concerning issues directly affecting the Spring Branch area by having a voice before the City's Neighborhood Alliance. (See Chapter 2-621, et seq Code of Ordinances, Houston, Texas, and the Memorandum of Understanding between the Alliance and the City of Houston dated March 17, 2003.)

As this restructuring takes hold, the Committee has been attending monthly meetings to discuss City issues affecting Spring Branch, and meet the various City officials who also attend.

Eventually delegates will be named to participate with the City's Alliance. If you have an interest in this endeavor, please contact the Association Office.

Trash Talk

As of March 5, 2026, the City of Houston has delayed the launch of its new on-demand heavy trash service continuing with the existing scheduled pickup system due to 311 service request backlogs.

The switch to a 311-based appointment system is on hold, with no new start date announced, as officials work to ensure the system is fully functional.

Residents should continue to follow the established monthly schedule and to call 311 to report problems with service.


Heavy trash is limited to a maximum of 8 cubic yards, approximately the size of a mini-van, and items must not be generated by contractors.

If service is delayed, residents can use the City's Residential Drop-Off Centers which are open Tuesday through Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and closed on Sunday and Monday.

Mosquito & Health Committee Report

A very warm welcome to all the new Spring Shadows residents on behalf of the Mosquito & Health Committee!

Houston is a Bayou City so we will always be battling the mosquitoes which are not just a nuisance, they may also carry serious diseases that can impact our lives and that of our pets. Years ago, Spring Shadows Civic Association formed a Mosquito and Health Committee to help control them in our area.

One way we do this is by contracting with a pest control service to fog/spray weekly from mid-March through November (the peak mosquito activity months). The chemicals used are sprayed in the suggested manner and in compliance approved by the County and the City's Board of Health. During the spraying months, service usually occurs late on Wednesday evenings. However, if for some reason the contractor is unable to spray (such as inclement weather or a holiday) the service will occur on the next date and time the contractor has available.

We ask that you do your part in the effort to control the mosquitoes by removing breeding areas of mosquitoes around

your property. Please be sure to check for low areas in your yard. Remember to empty plant saucers and rain gauges regularly and of course, always clean and maintain your swimming pools, hot tubs, water fountains and bird baths. Please check areas often, as the life cycle of the mosquito from egg to an adult is only 8-10 days.

Please check the curb in front of your home for leaves and debris which can cause street flooding as it washes towards the drains and accumulates with our neighbors' leaves, blocking the too few drains in our neighborhood. Never put anything into our street drains especially yard clippings. To do so is not only against the city ordinance, but causes street flooding and possibly neighborhood home flooding during rainstorms.

Remember to be vigilant to protect yourself and your family when outdoors by using repellent and wearing protective clothing. You also should discuss with your vet about ways to protect your pets from mosquito borne illnesses.

Patrol and Safety Committee Report

Hi Neighbors and welcome to Spring and Daylight Savings Time.

Even with these longer and brighter evenings, walking and biking as the streets darken continues to be a concern. Thanks to those of you who have taken to wearing light, reflective clothing, and/or flashing lights when walking or biking in the dark. Please remember to walk in single file if you are part of a group. Also please walk facing oncoming traffic so that you can see what is coming at you since we don't have sidewalks in most of Spring Shadows.

Another pedestrian issue that we want to mention, based on HOA received complaints, is people walking with their pets unleashed. Remember, by City of Houston ordinance, pets in front yards or on the streets are required to be on leashes. Fines typically range from \$200 to \$2000 dollars. Also, please remember to pick up any "presents" pets may leave. It is the neighborly thing to do.

Homeowners continue to report some motorists on our residential streets speeding, running stop signs, and generally driving without concern for the safety of others. Please help us keep Spring Shadows safe by obeying all traffic laws, signals, and signs. We all want to drive in a manner that displays care and respect for our fellow neighbors. And for added incentive, it helps to remember that the Constables are full law-enforcement officers and they can and do issue tickets, citations, make arrests, etc. They are there for the safety of our residents and they will enforce the law for any violation.

The BEST WAYS TO DEAL WITH EMERGENCY vs. NON-EMERGENCY LAW ENFORCEMENT CONTACT

Non-Emergencies: You are the eyes and ears for our Constables. Please call them at 281-463-6666 if you see anything suspicious. If you are hesitant, please don't be. Deterrence is a better solution than someone having to file a police report. If you do observe something happening, please do NOT confront the perpetrator. You might consider taking pictures and even following at a safe, but long, distance, but do NOT confront. This is for YOUR safety.

If you have provided SSCA with your email information, you are receiving SSCA emails. In February we sent out an email blast to homeowners with the following information. Specifically, we were advised that the Houston Police Department (HPD), because of lack of manpower, was turning over all NON-EMERGENCY calls in Spring Shadows to the Pct. 5 Constables for their handling.

This has caused a time delay between when HPD receives the non-emergency calls and when it contacts the Pct. 5 Dispatcher. The two departments are trying to work out how to reduce any time delays, but just know that as soon as Pct. 5 receives the call from HPD, it will dispatch a deputy to respond.

Because of these communication delays between the two departments, your best bet is to contact the

Banana Bread Recipe

Background

Sparky Joe, my beloved Doxle (Dachshund/Beagle Mix) rescued me 11 years ago on April 18th. One of his many escapades involved the last piece of a loaf of banana bread that I had baked. For some strange reason, I had wrapped the piece of banana bread in foil and set it on top of the toaster oven. I went to work for my usual 10 hour day... When I got home, I discovered that Sparky had been busy. He had jumped on the ottoman, jumped from the ottoman to the club chair, jumped from the club chair to the bar of the kitchen, and then he jumped onto the kitchen counter. He then took the foil-wrapped banana bread and reversed the process until he settled on the family room

floor. He managed to carefully unwrap the banana bread from the foil. Then he proceeded to eat the piece of banana bread. No crumbs were left. The only evidence was the unwrapped foil on the family room floor. Imagine my surprise when I got home that evening. I had to laugh at his determination and dexterity. I'm happy to report that no vet bills resulted from his activity. I've gotten smarter about storing banana bread.

Recipe

½ Cup Crisco
1 Cup Sugar
2 Eggs
1 ½ Cups Mashed Banana (3 Large Bananas)
2 Cups Flour
1 Teaspoon Salt
¼ Teaspoon Vanilla
1 Teaspoon Soda
2/3 Cups Chopped Nuts

Instructions: Cream the Crisco, sugar, eggs, and beat. Add mashed bananas, flour, vanilla, and nuts. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees Fahrenheit in a greased loaf pan.

Hints: I don't add the salt. I go heavy on the Vanilla (1 teaspoon instead of ¼) and the nuts (1 cup instead of 2/3). I use pecans or walnuts, depending on my mood. You can substitute chocolate chips if you have friends and family members that have nut allergies.



GREENER THUMBS:

GARDENING, LANDSCAPING, AND PLANT TIPS

My Blooming Success: Roxanne Richey **Director/EC at Large**

I was not born with a green thumb. I do manage to keep non-flowering plants alive. It's the prettier, showy plants that give me trouble. Oddly, I am successful with Christmas Cactus. The first one that I had lasted for many years. It bloomed like clockwork every Christmas and every Easter. My second Christmas Cactus is following the same pattern – blooming twice a year at Christmas and Easter.

Actually, there are three types of Holiday Cactus:

- Thanksgiving Cactus (*Schlumbergera truncata*) blooms from late fall to mid-winter. Its stems have a “crab” or “lobster” edge with pointed “teeth”. The stems grow upright and then arch.
- Christmas Cactus (*Schlumbergera bridgesii*) flowers from late November to early February. Its flat stem segments have smooth, scalloped edges that hang down like a pendant.
- Easter or Spring Cactus (*Rhipsalidopsis gaertneri*) blooms from late winter to mid-spring. It has flaring, trumpet-shaped flowers with pointy petals that open at sunrise and close at sunset.

Holiday Cacti are native to Brazil. Thanksgiving and Christmas Cacti grow in tropical rain forests. Easter Cacti grow in non-tropical forests. Holiday Cacti are hardy plants, sometimes living twenty years. The blooms may be white, red, magenta, pink, scarlet, purple, apricot, lilac, salmon, orange, or yellow.

They grow best when the temperature is between 60 and 70 degrees Fahrenheit, with 50 to 60 percent humidity, and bright, indirect light, facing east. They should be watered twice per month when they are not blooming and more often, with misting, when flowers appear. They are “pet friendly”.

Based on stem structure, my cactus is a Thanksgiving Cactus. It has both white and red blooms from November to March. It is facing south, is watered weekly, has never been misted, and the temperature in my home is rarely ever below 70 degrees. It's beautiful and brings me joy. Do as the professionals say, not as I do.

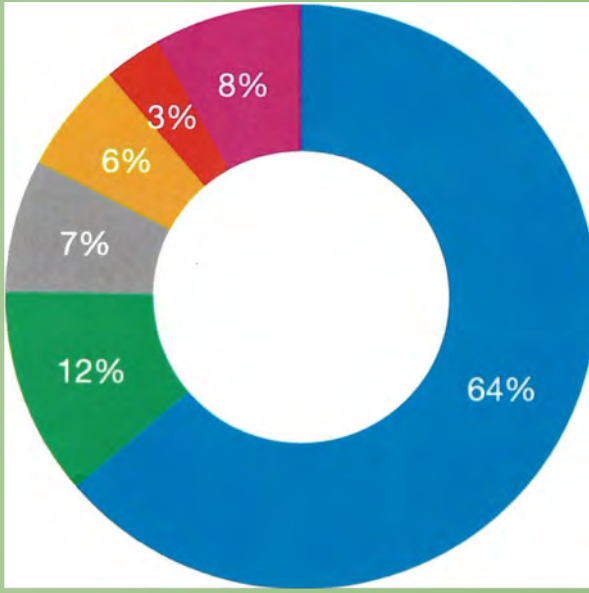

Terrace Elementary is beginning an exciting new chapter — a complete campus rebuild made possible by the voter-approved 2017 Spring Branch ISD bond. The new building will provide modern classrooms, updated infrastructure, and safe, functional learning spaces for generations of students.

While bond funding makes the new building possible, it does not cover many of the features that transform a school into the heart of a community — things like shaded playground spaces, gathering areas, and outdoor amenities that families can enjoy together. That's where the Back the Build campaign comes in.

A School and a Neighborhood Park

Terrace Elementary is also home to Terrace Park, a designated SPARK Park that is open to the public outside of school hours. This means the playground and outdoor spaces are used not only by students, but by families and neighbors throughout the community. The improvements made today will benefit our children, grandchildren, and neighborhood families for decades to come.

Our Goal: \$350,000

The Back the Build campaign aims to raise \$350,000 to fund meaningful enhancements that will make the new campus more welcoming, functional, and comfortable for both students and the community.

These improvements are based on planning and cost estimates provided by Spring Branch ISD.

Top funding priorities include:

- Shade structures for the playgrounds
- Outdoor benches and seating areas
- Drinking fountains
- Water bottle filling stations
- Outdoor tables for gathering and events

These additions may seem simple, but in Houston's climate they make a significant difference in how outdoor spaces are used and enjoyed.

Why Fundraising Is Happening Now

Adding these enhancements during construction is significantly more cost-effective than installing them after the campus is complete. Integrating them now allows them to be designed thoughtfully into the campus rather than retrofitted later at higher cost.

This rebuild represents a once-in-a-generation opportunity to shape the Terrace campus from the start.
